1. Call to Order

2. Roll Call

3. Approval of Minutes

Viana Dail motioned that the February SCY Board minutes be approved as presented. Bob Santillan seconded the motion. All members approved.

4. Financial Reports for the Senior Center of York

Carol Scott provided an overview of the Treasurer's report for February. Noteworthy donations were made during the month of February. Betty Titus made a motion to approve the Treasurer's report as submitted. Erika Mitchell seconded the motion. All members approved.

5. Committee Reports

A. Center Facility Operations

Tom McNamara, Facility Committee Chairperson, reported on the delivery and set up of purchased room air purifiers throughout the building. The total cost of the six air purifiers was \$3,391.52 and was made by the County of York. Mr. McNamara also thanked the group for his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday party and cards.

B. Center Programs

Buck Rodgers reported there were 931 patron visits during the month of February. This is a significant increase since the re-opening of the SCY during the COVID-19 pandemic. This number

does not include tax aide visitors. Mr. Rodgers reviewed some of the March calendar events and noted tentatively planned upcoming events. Mr. Santillan, facilitator of War Stories & Pizza reported there are now 13 participants in the program who are enjoying their time together sharing experiences. Music at the Center is being offered on Tuesday afternoons from 1:30-4 p.m. A scheduled karaoke event was cancelled due to low registration, but several showed up. Registration was reviewed to those who showed up and another date was set to hold the event as karaoke events require coordination and planning for equipment and support persons. Betty Titus and Carol Scott participated in the Bluebird program that was coordinated with the Tabb library. The Bluebird presentation was informative and Betty Titus said building the Bluebird house was fun. The library also assisted with facilitating the "Gardening in Small Places," by Nathan Brauner that will take place at the Center on April 21 at 10 a.m.

On April 19, an outing to Maymont in Richmond is scheduled. The cost to patrons is \$45 for a two-hour tour of the grounds and gardens. The mini-bus will stop in Williamsburg at the Chickahominy House for lunch on your own on the return from Richmond to the Center. Another outing to see a performance of "South Pacific" at the Ferguson Center is being planned for May 12. From May 17 to June 21, a weekly quilting class on Tuesdays from 1-3 p.m. is scheduled and will be taught by Julie Russell, an experienced instructor of beginning quilting. A "Paint Nite" is scheduled for June 15, from 5:30-7:30 p.m. with Kathy Wahl instructing. The painting theme will feature a 16x20 beach scene. An evening karaoke event is being planned for July 20 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. and on August 19 at 1 p.m. the SCY will host a magic show. Mike Steen of the Waterman's Museum will perform at the March Birthday Bash.

#### C. Health Programs

Minnie Sippio is reporting today. The Heart Health program in February had 5 participants. A Kidney Health program is scheduled for March 16 at 11 a.m. The Health and Safety Fair is April 20 from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. There are about 20 exhibitors including Riverside Cancer and screenings have all been confirmed. The Matter of Balance program is full with 12 people participating weekly. Registration is opened for the Car Fit event that will take place at the McReynolds Athletic Complex on April 26, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Each participant assessment takes about 20 minutes. Erika Mitchell commented that this was a good program. The Safety Summit is May 24<sup>th</sup> at Northside Christian Church in Tabb. Ms. Sippio announced that the S.A.L.T. agreement has been updated and will be a part of the program that day.

#### D. Peninsula Agency on Aging

PAA sent in a report and it was given to board members.

The Dining Club at the SCY is scheduled to resume on April 18. The meal program will be conducted on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

#### E. York County

Lynne McMullen is reporting in Brian Fuller's absence. The County has announced that masks are now optional in all County buildings.
